UTEP Chemistry Peer Leaders at Be My Neighbor Day



On Saturday, February 24, 2018, Dania Chairez, Shawnan Chen, and Miguel Orellana, three peer leaders from the PLTL Program in chemistry at UTEP participated in the El Paso area "Be My Neighbor Day" event sponsored by the Fred Rogers Foundation, KCOS (the local El Paso PBS station) The El Paso Chihuahuas (the tripleA baseball team), and hosted by Bassett Place Center shopping mall. This was advertised to the local community as an event filled with music, dance performances as well as local groups providing educational games and activities targeting age groups ranging from small children to adults. The organizations were there to either promote a product, educate people, or inform people about their cause. Keeping it interactive so the children would not get bored, the peer leaders helped spark children's interest in science using fun activities, interesting machines along with simple explanations. The bubbles created with dry ice in soapy water were exciting as they were simple and fun to make; the Van de Graff generator was also a big hit as the simple explanation given was enough for the children to understand that if they touched their parents they would shock them (they enjoyed that part the most).
