PRESIDENT HEATHER A. WILSON THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT EL PASO



The granddaughter of immigrants and the first person in her family to go to college, Dr. Heather Wilson became the 11th President of The University of Texas at El Paso in 2019. Dr. Wilson graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in the third class to admit women. She is a Rhodes Scholar, and earned her master's and doctoral degrees from Oxford University in England.

Before joining UTEP, Dr. Wilson served as the 24th Secretary of the United States Air Force and as a Member of Congress for ten years from New Mexico. She also served as the President of the South Dakota School of Mines & Technology.

As UTEP's President, her steady leadership has guided the university and its 25,000 students and 3,000 faculty and staff forward -- increasing research proposal submission, improving retention rates, adding degree programs and developing a long term enrollment strategy -- during a global pandemic. The Chancellor of the University of Texas System, James B. Milliken recently commended her successful leadership through one of the most challenging times in history, noting her "grit and grace" has benefited the entire community.

Active in community and national affairs, Dr. Wilson is a member of the National Science Board, which oversees the National Science Foundation. An instrument-rated private pilot and aircraft owner, she also chairs the Women in Aviation Advisory Board of the Federal Aviation Administration.

Dr. Wilson and her husband, Jay Hone, have three adult children.

At the University of Texas at El Paso, we are our stories. Just a few weeks ago I met Alma Hernandez. She graduated from UTEP with a degree in Microbiology. KEYNOTE WORKSHOP I THURSDAY, JUNE 3, 2021

Projects With Purpose: Telling Stories About Why You Do What You Do

Whether interviewing for a job, planning your professional trajectory, or trying to make sense of daily life, understanding and sharing stories about why you do what you do is essential. This workshop offers creative, scaffolded ways for participants to access and distill why they care about their work. Participants will leave with an integrated story about their personal stakes in an individual or team project, as well as with prompts and tools to help colleagues, peers, and students do the same.



JONATHAN ADLER is a Professor of Psychology at Olin College of Engineering, Needham, Massachusetts, and a Visiting Associate Professor of Medicine at Harvard Medical School. He is also the Chief Academic Officer of Health Story Collaborative, a non-profit organization aimed at elevating the role of personal stories in health care. Dr. Adler's research focuses on identity development, with an emphasis on the role narrating challenging experiences has on mental health. His research has been published in

leading scholarly journals and he serves as Associate Editor of both *Journal of Personality* (his field's oldest journal) and *Collabra: Psychology* (his field's newest journal). His research has been covered in The New York Times, National Public Radio, The Boston Globe, The Atlantic, Scientific American, CNN, BBC, and The Today Show, among other outlets. He lives in Newton, Massachusetts, with his husband and their two young children.



GILLIAN EPSTEIN is the Writing Initiatives Specialist at Olin College of Engineering, Needham, Massachusetts, where she coaches and cultivates writing and storytelling across both the curriculum and the community. Dr. Epstein's academic research focused on unreliable narrators in American realist literature, and this work has taken on a whole new life as inspiration for helping others experiment with multiple ways of telling and exploring their own stories. Her teaching, projects, and programs invite participants

narrating who they are and what they care about, with a focus on amplifying diverse voices and building insight, empathy and connection. Based on her belief that the practice and power of writing and storytelling is within everyone's reach, Dr. Epstein works with a broad range of people and organizations—including her ongoing teaching at Amazon Robotics and her creative partnership with a local artist commissioned to create community storytelling events. She lives in Lexington, Massachusetts, with her partner and almost fully grown-up children.

Participants will be coached through a series of individual and group activities to expand on these stories and craft collective stories that will help others understand, engage, and shape the future of PLTL programs and PLTLIS.

She is a big fan of emerging technology, human-centered design, and solving problems that matter.
